HOLY ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Who may receive this sacrament? First of all, any Catholic who is in danger of death, no matter what their status in the eyes of the Church, may do so. Even those who are in impaired communion with the Church, even those formally excommunicated, at the point of death may be anointed. In fact, it is the one sacrament a priest can give even if he is not perfectly sure the person is a Catholic. The reason, of course, is that Anointing forgives sins, which everyone wants to be free of as we pass through the gates of death to meet our Savior and Judge. Then, anyone who is seriously sick (not just a cold or minor flu) or chronically sick (cancer, heart disease) or admitted to the hospital, is a candidate for Holy Anointing. Anyone about to undergo a serious operation (general rather than local anesthesia is a pretty good criterion) may request it. Finally, since old age is a time of so many aches and pains and physical complaints, the elderly may ask for it as well. It is a very great blessing to know that not only prayer, but also one of the seven sacraments, is given us by God to comfort and strengthen us in our illnesses. We need never face our sickness alone.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

3 June ~ Saint Clotilda. The year of her birth is uncertain. Clotilda married the pagan king of the Franks, Clovis, around the year 492. She convinced him to baptize their first son, but the child died soon afterward. Clovis was enraged and blamed Christian baptism for his son's death. When a second son was born, Clotilda again insisted on having him baptized. He fell ill, but survived. Meanwhile, Clovis went into battle. As his army was on the verge of defeat, desperate, he called upon "Clotilda's God." The battle was won, and Clovis accepted baptism, along with about 3,000 of his subjects. When Clovis died in 511, the family fell prey to jealousy and bloodshed, yet God's grace prevailed. Her son Clodomir had his cousin assassinated, but later repented and entered a monastery. Her other two sons then fell upon two of Clodomir's sons and killed them. A third grandson, Clodoald, however, survived and became a monk. He is remembered as Saint Cloud (the city in Minnesota is named after him). After this, Clotilda retired to Tours, where she served the poor and the sick. Her two remaining sons, still warlike, were about to go into battle against each other; Clotilda prayed for a miracle and a sudden, severe hailstorm prevented their meeting in battle. Shortly thereafter, in 545, Clotilda died, and the two men reconciled to bury their holy mother. She is the patroness of brides and adopted children. Saint Clotilda, pray for us!


