HOLY MASS

The Preface: The dialogue before the Preface had ended with the people solemnly saying that it is "right and just to give thanks to the Lord our God." This gives the Preface of the Mass its main subject, no matter what season or saint is being celebrated: Thanksgiving. Eucharist is from the Greek word, eucharistia, that means just that, "thanksgiving." Whatever season or saint is being celebrated, the Preface gives thanks to God for the mystery of our salvation, the source and summit of which is the Eucharist we are celebrating. In the Preface, we are caught up in a never-ending circle of praise and thanksgiving. Here is a sample of one of the oldest Prefaces in our liturgy: "It is right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, Lord, Holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Through him the angels praise your Majesty, Dominions worship it, and Powers stand in awe. Heaven and the Virtues of Heaven, with the Blessed Seraphim, rejoice to sing their joy. With them, we sing the hymn of your glory, as without end we acclaim: Holy, holy, holy." The great message of the Preface is that we at Mass are participating in the heavenly liturgy, that we are one with the angels in heaven as we worship. Therefore, all our liturgy must be done with awe and reverence.

Saint of the Week

12 January Saint Anthony Mary Pucci

He was born in 1819 to a pious peasant family in a village about 20 miles north of Florence, Italy. When he was eighteen, he entered a Servite monastery in Florence, and was ordained a priest in 1843. He was immediately assigned as an assistant at Saint Andrew's parish in the coastal town of Viareggio, becoming pastor there in 1847. Anthony was to spend the remaining 45 years of his life in that same parish, fulfilling all his pastoral duties with the deepest love and humility. He was quiet, reserved even, but made an effort to know each of his parishioners individually. He especially devoted himself to hearing confessions and instructing children. Anthony promoted the work of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society, and worked tirelessly visiting the sick during two separate cholera epidemics. But his heart was most especially given to the poor. They, in turn, grew to have a great love for the man they called "il curation" the "little parish priest." Though he served for a time as superior of his Order, he remained faithful to his work in the parish. At the age of 73, he caught pneumonia after having given his coat to a poor man he met on the street. He died soon after in 1892 and was canonized by Pope John XXIII in 1962. Saint Anthony Mary Pucci, pray for us.
